Financial Summary.


Since 2003, The R&A Foundation has provided funding from the proceeds of The Open to support golf projects across the globe, from grassroots to the elite level.

Over two decades, we invested millions of pounds to increase access, performance and participation in golf around the world while developing relationships with a global collection of partners.

In the last year, we asked donors to join us by establishing a global philanthropy programme to increase the reach and impact of our work. These extra funds are all additional to The R&A's commitment to golf, enabling our projects to develop faster and our impact to go further.

Collectively, we are not only creating good for golf but good through golf.


Sources of Income in 2023



In 2023, funding from philanthropic donors, combined with the proceeds of The Open totalled £4.7 million. Donors may give unrestricted donations, but may also provide restricted donations and endow specific funds that align with our charitable objectives.


Total Philanthropic Commitment

Since the establishment of our philanthropy programme, individual, corporate and charitable trust donors have pledged £6.1 million. We have currently invested £1.8 million of this total into projects around the world.



Funding by Theme

The R&A Foundation allocates unrestricted donations through an annual process led by the Chief **Development Officer and Director** of Philanthropy and approved by the board. We evaluate projects on their strategic importance for impact across the globe and as a reflection of donor interest across all five of our charitable themes.

A Global Network of Supporters

While the home of golf and The R&A Foundation is in St Andrews, Scotland, golfers play and support our game all around the world. Our donors hail from countries on six continents, bringing unique perspectives and ambitions to our global philanthropy programme.



Investment in Partnerships

We maximise our impact around the globe by investing in projects in three distinct ways: we use our international network to partner with local charities and foundations, we use our long-standing relationships to support industry affiliate organisations and we use our unrivalled expertise in golf development to directly invest in and manage specific programmes.

Charitable Partners

Partners such as charities, universities and other organisations receive funding to deliver specific projects, scholarships and initiatives. This year we distributed financial support to 17 university golf programmes.

The R&A's Affiliates

National federations and organisations receive support for their ongoing programming delivering the global growth of the game. The Golf Foundation received £500,000 this year toward increasing the retention of juniors in the sport.

The R&A's Programmes

Funding is distributed to charitable programmes directly managed by The R&A and The R&A Foundation, such as The Royal and Ancient Golf Club Scholarship.



Africa Amateur Championship.

The 18th at Leopard Creek, a 535 yard par-5 with its island green sloping from right to left down towards the water, is one of the most daunting finishing holes in the game. It is the hole where Ernie Els concluded his final round in the 2007 Alfred Dunhill Championship with an 8, losing the title by one shot to John Bickerton.

Yet, in the baking South African sun, Altin Van der Merwe held his nerve on the 18th, not once but twice, through a thrilling three-way play-off, to secure victory at the inaugural Africa Amateur Championship. When asked what the moment meant to him, Van der Merwe simply replied, "everything".

It means just as much to thousands of young golfers across Africa.

final day of play. Van der Merwe wou pick up three shots to force a play-off. This unique event, a giant leap forward for the sport on the continent, has been years in the making.

Van der Merwe triumphed over 72 other players from 23 countries. Alongside, the inaugural Africa Amateur Women's Invitational brought 20 players from five countries, with Kyra van Kan triumphing by nine shots over the field.

At its core, the Championship is about inspiration and elevation, for players and audiences alike. The opportunity motivates competitors to raise their game like never before. The spectacle encourages young people across the continent to dream bigger and aim higher. The quality of the event transforms the expectations of everyone watching around the world about what is possible through golf across Africa.

An Unprecedented Platform

The Africa Amateur Championship and Women's Invitational are the centrepieces of The R&A's ambitious strategy to grow the game of golf across Africa and create opportunities for players and communities alike. This is a proven methodology - our Asia-Pacific Amateur Championship (in partnership with the Masters Tournament) and Latin America Amateur Championship (with the Masters and the USGA) have already become vital platforms for discovering the future stars of our sport and driving sporting and economic growth across the regions.

Because of the support of The R&A Foundation's donors, progress in Africa is moving faster than has been possible before. This is the first time a women's event has been held alongside the launch of the men's competition, ensuring parallel growth from the very start. Broadcasts of both championships reached more than 170 million homes across 70 countries, an enormous number for an amateur sporting event.

From players to coaches to greenkeepers, elite amateurs to first time golfers, adults to children, this inaugural championship and the many that will follow are raising ambitions and creating unprecedented opportunities.

This would not have been possible without the vision and generosity of Johann Rupert who invited The R&A to stage the inaugural Africa Amateur Championship at his Leopard Creek course.

Since its launch in 2022, the Africa High Performance Programme (AHPP) is creating a pathway to excellence for 18 of the best young African golfers each year. Our commitment over the next decade will spot and nurture new talent through the formation of an Africa High Performance Squad bringing together top talents from across the continent, whilst also developing coaching and golf infrastructure throughout Africa.

Participants, both players and coaches, are exposed to the rigorous standards and methodologies of the elite level, with the ultimate aim of closing the gap between South Africa and the rest of the continent. High performance pathway pilots are already being implemented in Egypt, Kenya and Zimbabwe.

The Round of a Lifetime

Nineteen year-old Matthew Bramford of Zimbabwe's only ambition for the Africa Amateur Championship was to play well on one of the great courses in the world. Little did he know he was about to shoot a round that would change his life forever.

On the first day of competition, Bramford shot a bogey-free 65, highlighted by an eagle on the par-4 6th and consecutive birdies on the 14th, 15th and 16th to lead the field. Although he would eventually slip back to fourth overall, his performance on the platform provided by The R&A had already been transformative.

Matthew had received an offer from a college in the USA to enrol in August but it required an enormous financial top-up. Following his performance at the Africa Amateur Championship, he received offers and scholarships from three different Division 1 colleges.

This is the fundamental purpose of this Championship - to transform lives and opportunities through golf.

With the funding to provide a wide range of employment, training and volunteering opportunities, our support maximises the impact that Golf It! has on the local community. The facility is a catalyst for economic growth, generating much needed job prospects within the historically deprived north-east Glasgow area.

Golf It! general manager Russell Smith is proud to employ and upskill local young people: "Most of our 50 trailblazers – the name we've given our new team members on-site – are from the local area." Through a volunteer pathway, 32 different volunteers each week explore working at the facility, learning the many different ways to get involved in golf.

Sustainable Futures

Golf It! has been designed from the ground up as an environmentally-friendly facility. All energy at Golf It! comes from renewable sources and none of its waste is sent to landfills, and it hosts more than 11,000 square metres of wildflower meadows and nearly 200 species of animal and plants on site.

This green foundation makes it the perfect location to host two greenkeeping scholars: Lucy Millar and Anton Shields. The young Glasgow locals participate in a programme, sponsored by Toro, that runs on a four year cycle: two years at Golf It!, one year in St Andrews and one year in Ohio.

This inspirational programme developed at Golf It! has created an educational and employment model for greenkeeping apprenticeships that The R&A Foundation will support in other locations in the coming years.

A Gateway to Learning

From in-curriculum golf activities to engaging school initiatives, Golf It! is shaping young minds and instilling a love for the sport. With a staff team dedicated to community and education engagement, the programme has rolled out to over 8,000 students in its first year. The schools programme is about more than golf - it is about fostering teamwork and sportsmanship and teaching essential life skills, like communication and problem solving, all while experiencing the joys of the game.



IMPACT

The G4D Open

It resembled a scene we have seen thousands of times: the crowd huddled around the 18th hole, holding its collective breath. But, as Brendan Lawlor's winning putt dropped into the hole, the importance of this moment extended beyond the course.

The inaugural G4D Open, developed with EDGA and staged by The R&A with the DP World Tour at Woburn Golf Club in 2023, was, as Lawlor himself has said, "a groundbreaking championship."

As groundbreaking as that moment on the 18th was, it was how closely it resembled the culmination of any other major competition that made it extraordinary. Because, in that moment, participants were not seen as people with a disability at all - they were elite golfers at the very top of their sport.

This is the purpose of The G4D Open. As the President of EDGA, Tony Bennett, says, "our aim is to make the unknown known, make the unfamiliar familiar, so that we can focus on the golf."

That is how we can inspire millions of people living with disability to try our sport, to strive for excellence and sporting immortality and to be defined not by their impairment but by their ability.

Vietnam Schools Programme

Although it has amongst the highest levels of engagement with golf across Asia, Vietnam also has some of the most unequal: 93% of all Vietnamese golfers are men and just 9% are juniors.

With our support, the Vietnam Golf Association is tackling this challenge head-on. By working directly with schools they are creating a diverse, youthful player base that will ensure golf is thriving in Vietnam for generations to come.

The programme has already engaged nearly 500 students across the country, through open days and introductory lessons, and will gradually facilitate a transition to traditional golf clubs for participants.

With two programmes already fully established in the Hanoi area in the north of the country, a programme about to launch in Nghe An and plans in place to expand to Ho Chi Minh City, the project will soon be country-wide. With training for PE teachers included, it is also designed to be self-sustaining, with each school continuing to offer golf as part of the curriculum after the initial year.

This pilot project is also testing a highly replicable model that could have far wider application around the world if it proves successful.

PARTNERSHIP

EDGA

With The R&A Foundation's support, and by collaborating with federations around the world, EDGA is transforming golf for the disabled at every level of the sport.

Sampling

By training and supporting volunteers and creating new access pathways, EDGA is providing thousands of people with disabilities with the opportunity to try golf for the first time, every year.

Participation

By providing free accessibility audits for golf clubs, working with designers on new courses and training hundreds of new coaches, EDGA is transforming services, environments and attitudes.

Competition

EDGA have created a pathway to the highest level through the EDGA and R&A 8-Stage Pathway, supporting national federations to implement plans to enable individuals with a disability to sample, participate and compete.

The R&A Golf and Nature Study

Sustainability at The R&A, as one of its core strategic objectives, seeks to future-proof the sport of golf and contribute to a brighter, greener future for our planet. Our sustainable golf initiatives are helping us better understand the relationship between golf and nature. At the heart of this endeavour lies the Golf and Nature Study, a comprehensive five-year research project of 27 championship golf courses.

The Golf and Nature Study delves into the intricate ecosystems of these courses, examining and tracking biodiversity indicators, such as bird and butterfly populations, to showcase the symbiotic relationship between golf and nature. With species decline at an unprecedented rate in human history, addressing biodiversity loss is an urgent environmental challenge of our time, making it imperative for golf courses to adopt sustainable practices and champion conservation efforts.

At the completion of its inaugural year, the study has found over 150 species of conservation concern and 14 habitats of principal importance protected on these courses. The findings affirm golf's potential as a powerful force for nature conservation.



The study demonstrates the value of prioritising environmentally-sound practices for golf courses - both for biodiversity and for business. It also highlights opportunities and incentives for other clubs to implement resource-saving and nature-protecting policies, whilst improving golfer experiences.

IMPACT

Golf Bioblitz

Bioblitzes bring together a local community and biodiversity experts in a collaborative race to find and record the variety of flora and fauna in a specific habitat or biome. These events are a fun and proven approach to large-scale natural data gathering and community engagement.

Bioblitzes are perfectly suited to the analysis of nature on golf courses. They can be completed in a short, intense period, which facilitates the gathering of complete datasets across a course, without having to suspend play for a lengthy period.

The first Golf Bioblitz, in memory of Helen Goodman, will take place at Carnoustie Golf Links in June 2024. It is the intention that this year's event will inspire new venues on The R&A's Championships rota to want to host their own Golf Bioblitz in future years. By modelling and systematising such events, clubs across the UK could help us build the largest dataset ever compiled on the vital biodiversity of golf courses.

CASE STUDY

Greenkeeping Scholarships: Cultivating a Sustainable Future

Educating greenkeepers in environmental best practices is the key to future-proofing our courses. In the face of labour shortages in the turf management industry around the world, support for the agronomists of the future is more important than ever.

With funding from The R&A Foundation, The R&A's Greenkeeping Scholarship Programme provides greenkeepers and apprentices access to professional development, practical experience and career opportunities. To date, the programme has funded over 500 scholars from more than 30 countries.





CASE STUDY

Helen Goodman: Our Links to Nature

For many years, on the desks of most of the executive assistants at The R&A sat identical signs. They read:

> "If I don't know the answer, Helen Goodman does."

Helen joined The R&A in 1979, at just 16, and over her career she helped organise The Open on nearly 40 occasions. She never worked for anyone else.

Ladies' European Tour Performance Institute

For elite athletes, exceptional performance requires For Physios far more than just refining their swing and perfecting their short game. For the very best, strength and conditioning coaching, performance nutrition and world class physiotherapy are vital for peak performance.

Although women's golf has made immense progress over the 45 years since the Ladies' European Tour (LET) was launched, health is one of the areas where the greatest inequality remains. Many competitions still have only a single physiotherapist for all female players.

With significant support from The R&A Foundation, the LET Performance Institute (LET-PI) and their team of specialist therapists and coaches is changing that:

For Professionals

At global tournaments, the LET-PI provides nearly 500 players with the world class services they deserve, wherever they are playing.

With medical professionals, the LET-PI creates new pathways to elite sport for female physiotherapists, nutritionists and coaches.

For Researchers

Through research institutions, the LET-PI support studies which elevate professional performance and benefit female golfers at every level.

We are working to create a future where every service currently available to elite male golfers is available to their female counterparts. The R&A Foundation's ongoing support and collaboration is indispensable to this mission."

These numbers are not the results of a science-fiction wonderdrug - they are the proven impact of regular physical activity.

We have known about the benefits of physical activity for decades, and recent research led by Dr Andrew Murray has established how these health benefits are achieved through golf. The challenge is not how we can help people live longer and better but how can we encourage people to embrace the opportunity in front of them?

This is the question a first-of-its-kind study, led by Professor Frank Sullivan at the University of St Andrews with support from The R&A Foundation, is helping to answer.

A sequence of pilot programmes, across six golf clubs in Fife, Scotland, is connecting individuals with mental and physical health needs and particularly low levels of physical activity, with a life-changing opportunity - a package of golf, nature and social activities designed to be accessible, enjoyable and still provide the same level of risk reductions.

Across these pilots we have already seen remarkable results. There is a clear demand for the programme among the target demographic and strong retention among participants once they begin to take part. Researchers have seen not only improvements in willingness to exercise and in general physical health as a result but also notable improvements in mental health, with many attendees reporting improvements to psychological wellbeing, including symptoms of anxiety and depression. This holistic impact is something no medication can offer.

Golf on Prescription is a unique collaboration between golf, research and healthcare professionals.

Golf Memories

By transcending the boundaries of time and memory, the Golf Memories programme offers solace, camaraderie and joy to all who attend. The project embodies the power of human connection through sport, storytelling and reminiscence.

At The R&A World Golf Museum, participants come together to share their love for the game and the memories it holds. Amidst artifacts and memorabilia of golf's history, individuals from all walks of life gather to reminisce and to forge new connections.

While open to all, the monthly sessions are designed to be dementia-friendly, specifically serving individuals with memory loss and their carers, by discussing favourite golf films and interacting with artifacts and recalling famous tournaments, players and courses. The reminiscence meetings offer people an opportunity to reconnect with their passion for golf and find moments of clarity and contentment amidst the disorientation of memory loss.

Through programmes like Golf Memories, the museum nurtures a compassionate community off the course — one that fosters inclusivity and honours the timelessness of golf.



2024 Projects.

As well as continuing to develop and fund many of the events, projects and programmes supported in 2023, philanthropic funding will allow us to support an even wider range of impactful work in 2024. Below are a few of the projects we are most excited about.

Fairways to Learning £80.000

Building on our success engaging the Glasgow Often underappreciated as a challenge for African community through the Golf It! facility, we are partnering with Kelvin College for the Fairways to Learning programme. This initiative will provide work experience, personal development and pathways to employment they can compete in WAGR events across Africa. for young people from disadvantaged backgrounds.


